2021 Alabama Boys State

The American Legion Alabama Boys State program returned to the campus of the University of Alabama from July 11th through July 17th. More than 600 students from across the state met in Tuscaloosa for this unique summit to receive hands-on leadership training in government and community service under the motto, "We Build Citizenship." Typically the program is for rising high school seniors, but due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 edition was postponed. This year, Boys State featured students who were selected to attend last year (HS Class of 2021), as well as those chosen to participate in the Class of 2022.

Alabama Boys State is one of the highest honors granted to Alabama students. Students are selected by their schools based on their demonstrated leadership, hard work, strong morals, and motivation in school and community activities.

At Boys State, student delegates find the opportunity to build new friendships, participate in a mock government, and hear from and meet a diverse array of Alabama leaders. Delegates have the opportunity to join interest groups that focus on their individual areas of interest such as law school, fire college, law enforcement academy, aerospace academy, lobbyists, city government, county government, constitutional convention, engineer/computer academy, and environmental interest group. Delegates also enjoy activity time where they can participate in recreational activities such as basketball, volleyball, softball, soccer, academic bowl, etc.

The American Legion believes there is no better way to assure the survival of our republic than to train our young people in the ideals and objectives of American government. By teaching youth to understand and appreciate the basic principles involved in the successful management of a democratic society, we can keep America strong and ensure freedom for future generations. These are the distinguished, long-standing objectives of American Legion Boys States. These objectives are accomplished through a unique summertime program, one that emphasizes not classroom lectures or textbook learning, but participation and personal experience in a model state, complete with its governing bodies and elected officials.

Boys State was founded and its courses of instruction were designed to supplement the information taught in high school civics classes. Boys State teaches that our form of government is good but that its preservation depends on intelligent, informed, and loyal citizens in combination with an honest and impartial administration of government activities.

Young men chosen to be Boys State participants can look forward to a wonderful and challenging experience. All who attend can acquire a better understanding and regard for two of our nation's benefits: freedom and democracy.

To kick off the week, Governor Kay Ivey shared her congratulations and expectations for our students. House Minority Leader Rep. Anthony Daniels (D-Huntsville), and House Rep Bill Poole (R-Tuscaloosa), and State Treasurer John McMillan also addressed the convention

One of the unique experiences of Boys State is a chance to hear from leaders across different areas of industry and government. Michael Kratsios, Managing Director of Scale AL, spoke to our delegates. Prior to joining Scale, Mr. Kratsios was the 4th Chief Technology Officer of the United States and also served as the acting Undersecretary of Defense.

Also speaking to our delegates was retired Col. Mark Valentine, who served as an F-16 pilot and Commander in the US Air Force before joining the private sector in the technology field. Col. Valentine serves as Vice Director of Alabama Boys State, and has been on staff for many years.



Attending Boys State were 57 delegates from schools in Madison County. In preparation for the convention, on June 29th, the Madison County American Legion Posts hosted a joint 2020/2021 Madison County Boys State Orientation at the Post 237 Annex. Yancy Mitchell, the Dean of Boys State Counselors, along with Larry Vannoy, District 12 Commander, were our guest speakers. A video presentation from Mason Laney, the 2018 Boys State Governor, was also featured. Approximately 45 delegates and their parents attended the Orientation. Pizza and soft drinks were served.

The Sons of the American Legion Post 237 Chapter sponsored most of the expense of chartering a bus for transportation to and from the Boys State convention. 21 delegates rode the bus to Tuscaloosa. Jerry Phelps and Steve Bowling chaperoned. 22 delegates rode the bus on the return trip on June 17th, John Lawler and Debbie Hepburn chaperoned.

Representative Anthony Daniels from Alabama House District 53 was able to obtain a grant to pay the Boys State registration fee for several Madison County delegates who required financial aid.

The Manhattan Project

Even before the outbreak of war in Europe in 1939, a group of American scientists, many of them refugees from fascist regimes in Europe, became concerned with nuclear weapons research being conducted in Nazi Germany. In 1940, the U.S. government began funding its own atomic weapons development program, which came under the joint responsibility of the Office of Scientist Research and Development and the War Department after the U.S. entry into World War II. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers was tasked with spearheading the construction of the vast facilities necessary for the top-secret program codenamed The Manhattan Project.

Over the next several years, the program's scientists worked on producing the key materials for nuclear fission---Uranium-235 and Plutonium-239. They sent them to Los Alamos, New Mexico, where a team led by J.Robert Oppenheimer worked to turn these materials into a workable atomic Bomb. Early on the morning of July 16, 1945, the Manhattan Project held its first successful test of an atomic device---a plutonium bomb---at the Trinity test site at Alamogordo, New Mexico.

Following additional successful testing President Truman decided---over the moral reservations of Secretary of War Henry Stimson, General Dwight Eisenhower and a number of the Manhattan Project scientists---to use the atomic bomb in the hopes of bringing the war to a quick end. Proponents of this bomb believed that its devastating power would not only end the war, but also put the U.S. in a dominant position to determine the course of the postwar world.

Hiroshima, a manufacturing center of some 350,000 people located about 500 miles from Tokyo, was selected as the first target. After arriving at the U.S. base on the Pacific island of Tinian, the more than 9,000 pound uranium 235 bomb was loaded aboard a modified B-29 bomber christened Enola Gay (after the mother of its pilot, Colonel Paul Tibbets). The plane dropped the bomb---known as "Little Boy"---by parachute at 8:15 in the morning, and it exploded 2,000 feet above Hiroshima in a blast equal to 15,000 tons of TNT, destroying five square miles of the city. →



Hiroshima's devastation failed to elicit immediate Japanese surrender, however, and on August 9 Major Charles Sweeney flew another B-29 bomber, Bockscar, from Tinian. Thick clouds over the primary target, the city of Kokura, drove Sweeney to a secondary target, Nagasaki, where the plutonium bomb "Fatman" was dropped at 11:02 that morning. More powerful than the one used at Hiroshima, the bomb weighed nearly 10,000 pounds and was built to produce a 22-kiloton blast. The topography of Nagasaki, which was nestled in narrow valleys between mountains, reduced the bomb's effect, limiting the destruction to 2.6 miles. At noon on August 15, 1945, Emperor Hirohito announced his country's surrender.

Alabama Veteran's Museum Re-Opening

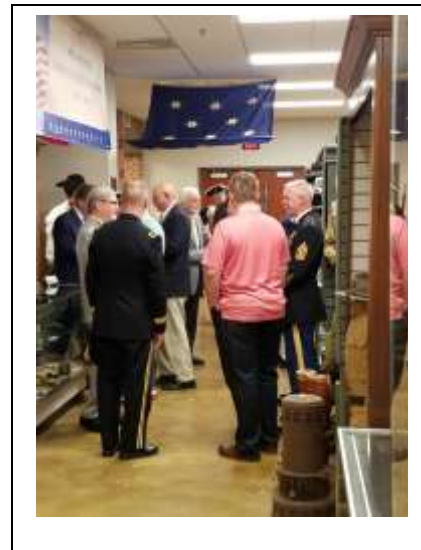

On Thursday, 2 July, 2021 Post 237 members, K. Carpenter (Historian), Michael Kinney (1st, V. Cdr), and Rudy Cowe (1st Yr. Trustee) and their wives were among the 500 attendees at the Grand Re-Opening of the Alabama Veteran's Museum in Athens. Governor Kay Ivey gave the keynote address, which followed addresses by U.S. Army Aviation and Missile Command Commander Maj. Gen. Todd Royer and St. Senator Tom Butler.

The new Pryor St. museum facility is across the parking lot from the 2002 veteran's museum held in the former L&N freight depot. The amount of display space of this \$900,000 project will double to about 8,000 sq. ft., of the 10,000 sq. ft. museum. The display items are all original or reproduction donated items featuring artifacts from the Revolutionary War to the present. There will be a library and two virtual reality stations featuring local veterans. In addition, there is about 10,000 sq ft. of event space with a stage and kitchen. This area, which will seat 400, and 300 persons for a seated dinner, has already been rented for wedding receptions and after-rehearsal dinners.

Like Huntsville's U.S. Veteran's Memorial Museum, the Athens Alabama Veteran's Museum is a great informative and valuable family outing site.

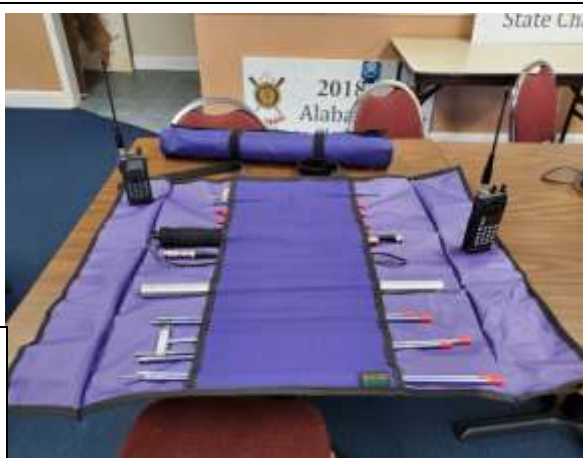

We had a great get together at last month's meeting with plenty of VHF and UHF equipment to look at and discuss.
