In Remembrance of Veterans Day

ADDRESS TO FELLOW-COUNTRYMEN

From The White House, November 11, 1919.

A year ago today our enemies laid down their arms in accordance with an armistice which rendered them impotent to renew hostilities, and gave to the world an assured opportunity to reconstruct its shattered order and to work out in peace a new and juster set of international relations. The soldiers and people of the European Allies had fought and endured for more than four years to uphold the barrier of civilization against the aggressions of armed force. We ourselves had been in the conflict something more than a year and a half.

With splendid forgetfulness of mere personal concerns, we remodeled our industries, concentrated our financial resources, increased our agricultural output, and assembled a great army, so that at the last our power was a decisive factor in the victory. We were able to bring the vast resources, material and moral, of a great and free people to the assistance of our associates in Europe who had suffered and sacrificed without limit in the cause for which we fought.

Out of this victory there arose new possibilities of political freedom and economic concert. The war showed us the strength of great nations acting together for high purposes, and the victory of arms foretells the enduring →

conquests which can be made in peace when nations act justly and in furtherance of the common interests of men.

To us in America the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service, and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of nations.

WHY SHOULD WE CELEBRATE VETERANS DAY?

Historically, this day was known as "Armistice Day" and was first celebrated to mark the end of World War I in 1918, which officially ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, i.e., November 11th. It became a federal holiday in 1938. In 1954 President Eisenhower signed the legislation officially changing Armistice Day to Veterans Day to honor the patriotism, service, sacrifice and love of our country of all veterans serving during all war eras.

We celebrate Veterans Day to honor all members of the military community who have answered the call to duty and to remember their sacrifices and courage while defending our country and its honor during both wartime and peacetime.

Veterans come from all walks of life, but they share several fundamental qualities. They possess courage, pride, determination, selflessness, dedication to duty and integrity---all the qualities needed to serve a cause larger than one's self.

Many of them didn't ask to leave their homes to fight on distant battlefields. Many didn't even volunteer. They didn't go to war because they loved fighting. They were called to be part of something bigger than themselves. They were ordinary people who responded in extraordinary ways in extreme times. They rose to the nation's call because they wanted to protect a nation which has given them so much.

From those who shivered and starved through the winter at Valley Forge to the doughboys crouched in the muddy trenches of France to the platoon who patrolled the jungles of Vietnam and the young man or woman patrolling the mountains of Afghanistan, we remember and honor them all.

On November 11 every year people throughout the country during community Veteran's Day parades and at veteran organizations, such as American Legion Post 237, gather together to remember, to honor, and to pay gratitude to those who have served our country. Our gatherings at these events is just one small spark in the flame of pride that burns across our country on that day and every day. It is not a lot, but one small way we can honor those who have allowed us to live in freedom.

Alabama Boys State

Alabama Boys State is a convention for outstanding boys who have completed their junior year of high school. The convention delegates are selected by their schools based on their character, leadership and their work at school and in the community.

Boys State is a week-long program at the University of Alabama Tuscaloosa campus. Delegates develop leadership skills and civics knowledge by creating a mock government and proposing and passing legislative agendas. Delegates also develop new friendships while participating in activities aligned to their areas of interest and in various recreation activities.

Post 237 chairs the Madison County Boys State effort. We host an Orientation Dinner and provide bus transportation for the delegates to and from Tuscaloosa. We also host a departure breakfast for the boys.

In 2019, 75 boys from 22 different high schools in Madison County participated. Of the 31 state-wide elected positions 12 were won by Madison County delegates. Chris Baker from James Clemens High School was elected as Boys State Governor. This is the second year in a row that a Madison County delegate was elected Governor and advanced to participate in Boys Nation in Washington DC.

In 2020 selection of delegates will begin after the new year and the convention will take place soon after the school year ends.

American Legion Baseball

More than half of current Major League players have played American Legion Baseball. Founded in 1925, American Legion Baseball is designed to develop character, leadership and baseball skills. It is also an opportunity for young athletes to showcase their talent.

Post 237 sponsors Junior Varsity, Varsity, and 19U teams. Coach Rick Bragg's teams have won the State Tournament in 2018 and 2019. Currently there are 16 alumni of Post 237 American Legion teams playing college baseball at eight different schools.

American Legion Oratorical Contest

The American Legion Oratorical Contest is a constitutional speech contest that provides scholarship opportunities for high school orators. Post 237 teams with the other American Legion Posts in Madison County to conduct the Madison County Oratorical Contest. The winner of the county contest can compete at the district, division, state and national levels. Nationwide over \$138,000 in scholarships are awarded each year.

In 2019, six contestants participated in the Madison County Oratorical Contest. Contestants deliver a prepared speech on some aspect of the U.S. Constitution followed by a shorter speech on a constitutional subject drawn randomly.

The upcoming county contest will be held at Madison City Hall at 10:00AM on January 25, 2020.

Led by Honor Guard Commander Earl Hokanson, we walked through the security doors to the room where we were met by Doctor Joseph Fitzgerald, the Civilian Aide to the Secretary of the Army and several members of the Huntsville Chapter of the Vietnam Veterans of America.

The large Flag Room was just beginning to fill with residents of Elmcroft and the family and invited guests of the seven veterans who were being honored for their service that day by the Department of Defense. →



Standing at Parade Rest under the large American flag behind the podium, the Honor Guard provided a uniformed backdrop for Dr. Fitzgerald as he gave a short but heartfelt speech on the meaning of the word Veteran and a reading of the service of each of the seven men outlining their contributions during WW2, Korea and Vietnam, before presenting each one with a certificate and special coin and a warm handshake to the applause of the many in attendance at the ceremony.

As I was on the line with the other members for the event, I enlisted the aid of Richard Crimes, Board Director, Photographer and Videographer for the VVA Ch. 1067, who took many pictures for me that day including the ones you see here.

Dr. Fitzgerald graciously posed with each of the seven men and their families, thanking them for their service and at the end of the ceremony also thanked each member of the Honor Guard and the members of the Vietnam Veterans of America for our attendance and our service, saying that we had made the day special.

In truth, it was the seven men being recognized that day and their service who had made this detail a very special duty.

UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS

Michael Kinney Historian: American Legion Post 237

American Legion Post 237 and the newsletter would like to wish the United States Marine Corps a very happy two hundred and forty-fourth birthday. The United States Marine Corps was established on November 10, 1775, to augment naval forces in the Revolutionary War. The recruiting headquarters was set up by Capt. Samuel Nicholas in the Tun Tavern on Water Street in Philadelphia, which is considered to be the birthplace of the Marines.

The United States Marine Corps traces its roots to the Continental Marines of the American Revolutionary War, formed by Captain Samuel Nicholas by a resolution of the Second Continental Congress on 10 November 1775, to raise two battalions of Marines. That date is regarded and celebrated as the date of the Marine Corps birthday. At the end of the American Revolution, both the Continental Navy and Continental Marines were disbanded in April 1783. The institution itself would not be resurrected until 11 July 1798. At that time, in preparation for the Quasi-War with France, Congress created the United States Marine Corps. Marines had been enlisted by the War Department as early as August 1797 for service authorized by the Congressional "Act to provide a Naval Armament" of 18 March 1794, which specified the numbers of Marines to recruit for each frigate. →

The Marines' most famous action of this period occurred during the First Barbary War (1801–1805) against the Barbary pirates, when William Eaton and First Lieutenant Presley O'Bannon led eight Marines and 500 mercenaries in an effort to capture Tripoli. Though they only reached Derna, the action at Tripoli has been immortalized in the Marines' hymn and the Mameluke sword carried by Marine officers.

The Corps celebrated its birthday, or Marine Corps Day, on July 11 from 1799 until 1921 when the date was permanently changed to November 10 to commemorate the establishment of the Corps to aid in the Revolutionary War.

The day is still observed by U. S. Marines worldwide. Special exhibits, parades, drill team performances, and speeches typically mark the occasion. The Birthday Ball, which culminates in the cutting of the birthday cake, is held that evening in Washington, D.C. It is not possible to determine precisely when the first cake ceremony was held, but the first on record took place at Marine Barracks, Washington, D.C., in 1937. Major General Thomas Holcomb, the Commandant, presided at an open house for Marine Corps officers, including the cutting of a huge cake in the shape of Tun Tavern.

The present Commandant of the United States Marine Corps is General David H. Berger. Did you know these other interesting facts about the United States Marine Corps? The 7th Commandant, Brigadier General Jacob Zeilin (first in the Corps) officially approved the design of the Eagle, Globe, and Anchor, and the 8th Commandant; Major General Charles G. McCawley chose the Latin phrase, *Semper Fidelis*, for "Always Faithful", as the official Marine Corps motto. ♦
