The Lord's Prayer

Matthew 6:9-13

9 After this manner therefore pray ye: Our Father which art in heaven, hollowed be thy name.

10 Thy Kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven.

11 Give us this day our daily bread.

12 And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors.

13 And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: For thine is the kingdom, and the power and the glory forever. Amen

Let us examine a bit closer the Lord's Prayer. First of all the very beginning strikes us "Our Father" this expresses a familial relationship with God the Father and therefore is a conversation as open and sincere as one may have with your earthly Father, for the Heavenly Father loves you even more and wants to communicate and have fellowship with you, daily.

"Which art in Heaven" These few words are a validation that we recognize first God as our Father and that his presence is before us as we pray.

"Hollowed be thy name", we honor the Father knowing his name is Holy and set apart from any other name.

"Thy kingdom come, thy will be done" this part of the prayer tells God that we understand that we invite him to come into our lives daily for fellowship and we accept his will for our lives without question.

"On earth as it is in heaven" we ask God to lead us as he will do in eternity today on this earth as it will be in heaven.

"Give us this day our daily bread" a simple prayer of thanksgiving knowing our God, the Father will take care of us and provide us with the spiritual and earthy food we need. This speaks more of the spiritual food we need through daily prayer and Scripture reading.

"And forgive us our debts" as we come to the Lord daily we want to be spiritually clean asking for his forgiveness even for the smallest sins, understanding a "saved" individual has had all sins forgiven, past, present and future. Our daily confession allows us to exam our hearts every day. "As we forgive our debtors", this is the crucial part of the sentence, because we cannot come before God if we harbor unforgiven sins of others against us. How can we expect God to forgive us if cannot forgive others.

"And lead us not unto temptation but deliver us from evil" We petition God to keep us away from Satan's temptations (we all have them) and to deliver us unto him away from temptation, we are weak and are unable to resist Satan without God's help.

This is the point that some religions stop and do not include the doxology as most protestant religions do. Either way the Lord's Prayer is powerful and puts you in the presence of God for prayer and contemplation and provides God some time with you to influence your heart and provide you with his everlasting love. HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO THE UNITED STATES NAVY

In an effort to curb British sea control, the Continental Congress established the Continental Navy, which later, on October 13, 1775, became the United States Navy.

The early Continental Navy was designed to work with privateers to wage tactical raids against the transports that supplied British forces in North America. To accomplish this mission the Continental Congress purchased, converted, and constructed a fleet of small ships---frigates, brigs, sloops, and schooners. These Navy ships sailed independently or in pairs, hunting British commerce ships and transports.

Two years after the end of the war, the money poor Congress sold off the last ship of the Continental Navy, the frigate Alliance. But with the expansion of trade and shipping in the 1790s, the possibility of attacks by European powers and pirates increased, and in March 1794 Congress responded by calling for the construction of a half-dozen frigates.

Over the past nearly two and one-half centuries, our Navy has grown to become the largest, most advanced, and most lethal fighting force the world has ever known. In 1972, the Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral Elmo Zumwalt, designated October 13 as the Navy's official birthday, and directed that it be commemorated so as to "enhance the appreciation of our Navy heritage" and reinforce "pride and professionalism in the Navy service."



Important Firsts in Naval History:

- First use of submarine: While the Navy's first commissioned designs for a submarine were completed in 1875, it wasn't until 1898 that the first Holland submarine launched successfully.
- First use of modern battleships: While America had battleships before the 1908 South Carolina class dreadnought, which started with the USS Michigan and was based on British ships, these were the first in the new era of battleships.
- 3. First use of naval aircraft: In 1911, the U.S. Navy bought its first airplane, the Curtiss A-1 Triad.
- First aircraft carrier: The first flight from the deck of a U.S. Navy cruiser in 1910 led to the 1927 Lexingtonclass aircraft carriers, the first operational aircraft carriers in the U.S. Navy.
- First use of Rigid Hull Inflatable Boat: Introduced in 1992, these rubber boats were originally meant for life boats in the 1960s, but the Navy now uses them for SEALs due to their lightweight, high speed, all-weather specifications.

FORTY & EIGHT FLAG UNVEILING K. Carpenter, Historian

Post 237 Honors the Fallen Thirteen

At the General Membership meeting held on 20 Sept., 2021, Post 237 honored the memory of the thirteen service men and women who lost their young lives on 26 Aug., 2021in the terrorist attack at Hamid Karzai International Airport Kabul, Afghanistan, while supporting Operation Freedom's Sentinel. At least one hundred and seventy Afghans were also killed. Thirteen empty chairs, each with the photograph and name of the fallen, were placed in a semi-circle in front of the Post officers stations. Their names were presented during the Post Everlasting segment at the conclusion of the meeting. In their honor, Post Commander Heatherly ordered the Post American flag to half-mast until 11 Sept..
